Target Audience

Goals

Educational Objectives

Upon completion of this program, participants should be able to: 1) Discuss current controversies in the multidisciplinary management of patients with melanoma and sarcoma as well as pancreatic, hepatocellular, thyroid, rectal and breast cancer including accurate diagnosis of ductal carcinoma in-situ (DCIS); 2) Describe recent advances in the management of pancreatic cystic neoplasms (IPMN), targeted molecular therapies for gastrointestinal stromal tumors (GIST) and innovations in regional perfusion therapies; 3) Discuss advances in basic science and translational research through presentations of original novel research performed by members of the Society; 4) Identify the challenges and opportunities associated with advancing state-of-the-art surgical oncology care in the developing world through presentations by Society members with direct leadership experience around the world; and 5) Recognize the potential impact of the recent health care reform legislation on cancer care and also discuss issues associated with disparities in the delivery of cancer care.

Basic Breast Ultrasound Workshop:
